

Smart Ways to Give Before Year-End

As we approach the end of the calendar year, you can take advantage of several tax-smart giving options. Your support helps us provide the ministries here at Prince of Peace.

1. Give from Your IRA (Qualified Charitable Distribution)

If you are 70½ or older, you can make a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) directly from your IRA to Prince of Peace. A QCD counts toward your Required Minimum Distribution (RMD). You pay no income tax on the amount transferred. You can give up to \$108,000 annually. Ask your IRA administrator to make the distribution directly to Prince of Peace and not directly to you.

2. Recommend a Grant from Your Donor-Advised Fund (DAF)

If you have a DAF through your financial institution or community foundation, you can recommend a grant to Prince of Peace. It's an easy, flexible way to support POP. You can make one-time or recurring gifts from your DAF. You may also name Prince of Peace as a beneficiary of your DAF to continue your legacy. Ask your fund advisor to direct your gift to Prince of Peace.

3. Gifts of Appreciated Stock

A gift of appreciated securities, such as stocks, bonds, or mutual funds, can provide meaningful support for POP's mission while offering significant tax benefits. You can avoid capital gains taxes on appreciated assets. You can deduct the fair market value of your gift. Prince of Peace receives the full value of your contribution. Matthew 17:22-27

Jesus Again Foretells His Death and Resurrection

22 As they were gathering in Galilee, Jesus said to them, "The Son of Man is going to be betrayed into human hands, 23 and they will kill him, and on the third day he will be raised." And they were greatly distressed.

Jesus and the Temple Tax

24 When they reached Capernaum, the collectors of the temple tax came to Peter and said, "Does your teacher not pay the temple tax?" 25 He said, "Yes, he does." And when he came home, Jesus spoke of it first, asking, "What do you think, Simon? From whom do kings of the earth take toll or tribute? From their children or from others?" 26 When Peter said, "From others," Jesus said to him, "Then the children are free. 27 However, so that we do not give offense to them, go to the sea and cast a hook; take the first fish that comes up; and when you open its mouth, you will find a coin; take that and give it to them for you and me."

I found this article on the internet. Let me first say that some of these statements are assumptions and not based on anything more than that. The type of coin, the type of fish, etc. YOU CAN still order St. Peter's Fish at restaurants in Tiberias, a town on the shore of the Sea of Galilee, and you will be served Tilapia.

The Temple Tax

Following an order by Julius Caesar, all Jews throughout the Roman Empire were required to pay the Jewish temple tax in order to fund the maintenance of the Temple in Jerusalem. The amount decreed for the temple tax – originally instituted to 'pay' for each person's sins - was half a shekel of silver (see Exodus 30:11-16). In Jesus's day, this was equivalent to two silver Roman denarii or two silver Greek drachmas (about two day's wages), and the collectors were called didrachmae.

When Jesus was approached about paying his temple tax, he told Peter to catch a fish on a line and to open its mouth. When Peter did so, he found a stater – a four-drachma coin (the equivalent of a silver shekel) - which was exactly enough to pay the temple tax for them both. The fish was probably a Tilapia (or 'St Peter's Perch') which has a marked pouch beneath its mouth where tiny young fish hide from danger. So let's move beyond the fish issue and get to the Temple Tax issue.

Here is the Message translation for today's verse:

22-23 As they were regrouping in Galilee, Jesus told them, "The Son of Man is about to be betrayed to some people who want nothing to do with God. They will murder him—and three days later he will be raised alive." The disciples felt terrible.

24 When they arrived at Capernaum, the tax men came to Peter and asked, "Does your teacher pay taxes?"

25 Peter said, "Of course,"

But as soon as they were in the house, Jesus confronted him. "Simon, what do you think? When a king levies taxes, who pays—his children or his subjects?"

26-27 He answered, "His subjects."

Jesus said, "Then the children get off free, right? But so we don't upset them needlessly, go down to the lake, cast a hook, and pull in the first fish that bites. Open its mouth and you'll find a coin. Take it and give it to the tax men. It will be enough for both of us."

As the saying goes, there are two things that are certain – death and taxes. Jesus addresses both!

The reality is that we do not need to pay to go to worship. This is probably not what the church council wants to me say right now as we begin our annual stewardship campaign. But it is the truth.

I recall early on in my first years of ministry making visits on some of our homebound members. Some of them thought I was coming to "collect their dues." Churches were expected to give a certain amount of money to the synod (our larger church body) for each member. And some churches passed that request on to their members that they pay their dues. I assured them I was not the tax collector, but the pastor bringing God's Word and Sacrament to them.

How do you see your giving to the church? Is it a due that has to be paid, or a cheerful response to what God has given you?

The other truth is that all that we have are gifts from God. We are called to be stewards of it, not owners of it.

In response to what God has done for us, how are we using what has been entrusted to us?

One final truth - Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again!

OH – one last note – any money you find in any fish you catch, I expect that to be in the offering plate (please wash it first!).

Let us pray: Dear God, may we be good stewards of all that you have given us. We pray this in Jesus' name. Amen.
