PASTOR CHARLIE'S BLOG

Matthew 25:1-13

[Jesus said to the disciples:] 1"Then the kingdom of heaven will be like this. Ten bridesmaids took their lamps and went to meet the bridegroom. 2Five of them were foolish, and five were wise. 3When the foolish took their lamps, they took no oil with them; 4but the wise took flasks of oil with their lamps. 5As the bridegroom was delayed, all of them became drowsy and slept. 6But at midnight there was a shout, 'Look! Here is the bridegroom! Come out to meet him.' 7Then all those bridesmaids got up and trimmed their lamps. 8The foolish said to the wise, 'Give us some of your oil, for our lamps are going out.' 9But the wise replied, 'No! there will not be enough for you and for us; you had better go to the dealers and buy some for yourselves.' 1OAnd while they went to buy it, the bridegroom came, and those who were ready went with him into the wedding banquet; and the door was shut. 11Later the other bridesmaids came also, saying, 'Lord, lord, open to us.' 12But he replied, 'Truly I tell you, I do not know you.' 13Keep awake therefore, for you know neither the day nor the hour."

As we read this lesson, we have to realize is that the people in the days shortly after Jesus left certainly too did wonder when and IF Jesus would return. Now, granted, they hadn't been waiting as long as we have, but they thought for sure that Jesus was only going to be gone for just a short while and then would return within their very own lifetimes!

And when that wasn't happening, in their expectation of the second coming of Jesus in the flesh, the bridegroom (as Jesus is several times depicted in the Bible), the bridegroom, so it seemed was delayed.

And so this parable was recorded to give them comfort, to give them purpose in the meantime while they waited.

In Jesus' story, the bridesmaids are waiting through such a delay. But even though the groom was delayed, they were to be ready for his arrival and escort him into the wedding feast. Five of them, however, were not ready. They had time to get the extra oil they needed, but they did not feel the sense of urgency to do it right away. So when the groom arrived they had to rush off to the store to buy more oil. The problem was that when they returned and sought entrance to the feast, they were considered no different than other uninvited seekers. The feast had begun and the doors were locked. It was too late.

In an Eastern culture the bridegroom is often a more important figure than the bride and frequently paid for all the expenses of the wedding. A Jewish wedding had three parts or stages to it. First, there was the formal engagement/betrothal which was almost always arranged by the parents of the future bride and groom. Later (up to a year or more) came the formal religious ceremony in the bride's home. This was a religious service similar to our wedding service. Thirdly, there was the wedding banquet (feast), generally at night, at the house of the groom and it generally lasted about seven days and could take place right after the ceremony or weeks later. The bridegroom would come to get his bride and they would walk together to the wedding. It was an elaborate affair that cost a lot of money.

It was, therefore, a social event to which their friends were anxious to attend. The bride and the groom walked down the street and their bridesmaids would take part in the 'welcoming ceremony' by lighting the way with lamps held by the wedding party. It would be a major faux pas for anyone in the wedding party not to be by the road ready to welcome the bridegroom and bride.

That is the background of the picture our Lord draws here. Here are ten young women waiting to join the wedding party. They are expecting and waiting for the bridegroom and the bride. (Richard A. Todd, Ten Sleepy Women)

When we hear of the "end times" and Christ's return, it is not a cause for panic or fear, but anticipation and joy. Episcopal priest and author Robert Capon puts it this way:

What we are watching for is a party. And that party is not just down the street making up its mind when to come to us. It is already hiding in our basement, banging on our steam pipes, and laughing its way up our cellar stairs. The unknown day and hour of its finally bursting into the kitchen and roistering its way through the whole house is not dreadful; it is all part of the divine lark of grace. God is not our mother-in-law, coming to see whether her wedding-present china has been chipped. He is funny Old Uncle with a salami under one arm and a bottle of wine under the other. We do indeed need to watch for him; but only because it would be such a pity to miss all the fun.

May we be ready for the party to come!

Let us pray: Almighty God, we give thanks for today, and we know that you have tomorrow in hand. May we trust, prepare and hope. We pray this in Jesus' name. Amen

A TRUE SENSE OF. . COMMUNITY

My name is Michelle Lehman. My husband is Tom, and we have two children, Brianna (16) and James (9). We were previously members of a small church in Lakewood where we live, and we loved our church family there (and still do!). However, as the kids were growing, we felt as though we wanted to give them an opportunity to grow in faith with more children of their own ages. So in 2017, we decided to attend a few services at other local churches. Prince of Peace was the last church we visited because I think we pretty quickly knew we had found our new church home. The people were so welcoming and interested in us, Pastor Bishop was very engaging, and there were kids —we were so happy to see children!

Throughout my life, I have been blessed to be surrounded by many generous people, both family and friends, one of which is my older sister Kathy. By nature, she has always been a giving person. She is 13 years older than me and has always looked out for me. When I was 18, she and her husband, Lito, let me live with them. They were in their early thirties at that time and had two small children. For a year, they gave me a home, food, love and guidance. I have always been appreciative of what they did for me and that time with their family. However, now that I have passed my thirties, and I am raising my own kids, I realize just how much generosity they displayed to invite me into their home at that point in their lives. It is something I will always remember and cherish.

The generous nature of the congregation is something that attracted us to Prince of Peace. I see this in the actions of all those who bring a true sense of community to our church, always looking to bring members together and other ways aimed at helping people. It is found in so many places, whether it's gathering in between services, the many groups that either meet for fun or meet to do community outreach, or in the various collections that are held to benefit others. There is definitely something for everyone.

Generosity is something I witness every Sunday when the kids attend Sunday school. We have been blessed with consistent leaders who give their time to share the stories of Jesus in a setting that's engaging for the kids. We have witnessed how this sense of community extends beyond the walls of the church building — such as when we go on fun outings to places like the Cat Cafe or when we meet for a Monsters hockey game. The adults leading the programming have been such good role models, and I appreciate the time they take to get to know each child and the interest they take in what is going on in their lives outside of church. We are looking forward to participating in future events like Brianna attending the National Youth Gathering next summer and what the future holds as James gets older.

From the beginning, we have felt the sense of community among the adults as well. A personal example of this was in mid-November 2022. After the service had ended, the person behind me casually asked how I was doing. It is not typical of me to be so forthcoming when I am not feeling my best, but for some reason, I went on to share how sad I was. Just a couple of days prior to this service, we found out that Tom's oldest and best friend had died tragically in an accident in Alaska. This person listened to me talk about Josh and what had happened, showed genuine care and concern, offered condolences, and then we went on with our day. The next week, I saw that the family was lifted up in prayer at our services, and we received words of encouragement and a couple cards at home. The person I talked to after the service cared enough to let another know of what we were going through. It may have been a small act to this person, but it led to us being lifted through a difficult time.

We all have it within us to spread goodness by sharing our gifts with others, and we are fortunate to have various opportunities so close at hand. Generosity is something that can be offered through donations of money or government of kindness, or just being there for someone in need. These acts, no matter how small contribute to supporting our missions at Prince of Peace and making a difference to current generations.


PoP Youth
